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# New Funding Opportunities

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## Parks for People Programme Opens for Applications (UK)

The Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) has announced that the next closing date for applications to the Parks for People programme is the 28th February 2009. Launched originally as a joint initiative with the Big Lottery Fund full responsibility for the programme will pass to the Heritage Lottery from April 2009. Local Authorities as well as not for profit organisations that own public parks and gardens can apply for grants of between £250,000 and £5 million for the regeneration of parks and public gardens.

The definition of a park for this programme is as follows:

- an existing designed urban or rural green space, the main purpose of which is for informal recreation and enjoyment.
- it includes parks, gardens, squares, walks and promenades.

The priorities for selection of a park for funding are:

- the community values the park as part of their heritage;
- the parks meets local social, economic and environmental needs;
- and the park actively involves local people.

The five outcomes for your proposed project are:

- increasing the range of audiences
- conserving and improving the heritage value
- increasing the range of volunteers involved
- increasing knowledge and skills
- improving management and maintenance

Applicants will need to raise at least 30 % of the project costs from their own sources and partnership funding, either as cash or non-cash contributions. The 'Parks for People' programme has a two-stage application process. If a Stage One Pass is awarded, applicants can submit a Stage 2 application. Recent awards include:

- A £1.84 million grant to restore Castle Park in Fordsham, Cheshire back to its original historic landscape and to improve sports facilities, the play area, and cafe and kiosk facilities
- A £3.5million grant to restore the historic landscaping and buildings, upgrading footpaths, entrances, furniture and signage of Brockwell Park which is located between Brixton, Norwood and Dulwich.

## **Government Announces Funding for Seaside Resorts (England)**

The Government has announced that four Seaside Towns are to receive £12 million of funding through the Sea Change Programme. Southport, Great Yarmouth, Bridlington and Hastings are the latest towns to receive grants from the scheme. Sea Change which is managed by the Commission for Architecture and the Built Environment (CABE) is a three year grants programme that will run until 2011 and aims to regenerate deprived sea side towns. There are two funding streams. Through the Open Programme, Local Authorities can apply for grants of between £200,000 and £1,000,000 to fund innovative and inspirational cultural projects. These can include:

- Cultural projects which will contribute to local place-making
- Arts projects which provide new opportunities for local communities and visitors
- Improving the quality and the experience of the historic environment
- Natural and built environment and public space projects.

Feasibility grants are also available for projects that are at an earlier stage in their development with a view to developing a full application for a later round. In addition to the Open Programme, CABE will also provide grants of up to £4 million through a proactive commissioning process (applications by invitation only). A further funding round will open in early 2009. Deadlines for submitting applications will be the 30th April 2009 for proactive grants making programme and the 30th June for Open Application Grants.

## **GreenPrints (England)**

A partnership of five of the country's leading not-for-profit organisations have come together to provide support and funding to help young people improve green spaces in their communities. SITA Trust, v the youth volunteering charity, BTCV, The Wildlife Trusts and the BBC's Breathing Places campaign, have joined forces to develop a two-year programme called GreenPrints which will offer funding of up to £10,000, as well as support and practical expertise from the partners, to enable 16–25 year olds to make a real difference to the communities in which they live by improving green spaces for people and wildlife. The funding is open to not for profit organisations for projects designed and delivered by groups of volunteers aged 16 to 25. SITA Trust and v have each pledged £1 million to fund the programme, making it one of the largest single investments made by either organisation to any funding programme. The overall programme will be managed using the expertise and experience of SITA Trust and BTCV. One of the most unusual elements of this programme is the individual, dedicated mentor-support that will be provided by the BTCV and The Wildlife Trusts to assist with the practical delivery of every single project that is supported.

## **European Training Grants for School Education Staff (UK)**

UK schools looking to develop the skills of their education staff have the opportunity to apply for funding through the European Commissions Comenius – In-Service training programme. This is part of the EU's Lifelong Learning programme and provides financial support to help improve the quality of school education by enabling staff to undertake training in a country other than that in which they normally work or live. In this way, participants are encouraged to improve their practical teaching/coaching/counselling/management skills and knowledge, and to gain a broader understanding of school education in Europe. The training activity must have a strong European focus in terms of subject matter and the profile of trainers and participants. The funding is available to school education staff (teaching and non-teaching), also unemployed teachers and teachers reentering the profession after a period away from teaching. Applications have to be made via the school and the level of funding available is up to:

- €1500 Euro 1 week
- €2000 Euro for 2 weeks
- Up to a maximum of €2500 Euro for 6 weeks.

A higher grant may be awarded where special needs or exceptionally high travel costs are involved. The next closing date for applications is the 30th April 2009.

## **Funding for Community Facilities (England, Scotland & Wales)**

The SITA Trust which is a funding organisation that supports community and environmental improvement projects around waste treatment and landfill sites owned by the waste management company SITA UK has announced that the next application deadlines under its enhancing communities programme are the 31st March for its Large Grants programme and the 5th February for its Small Grants programme. Under its Large Grant programme grants of between £10,001 and £50,000 are available to not-for-profit organisations including community groups, parish councils, charities, local authorities and voluntary organisations to fund physical improvements to community, sport or historic buildings/structures within 3 miles of a Sita site. The Small Grants Scheme provides fast-track access to funding for community improvement applications of up to £10,000 within 10 miles of a Sita site.

Previous projects funded include:

- Richmond Canoe Club which received a grant of £25,000 for the Richmond Canoe Club Refurbishment Project This project renovated the premises to bring the facilities up-to-date and accessible by a wider variety of people, including young people and youth organisations. The Trust's funding contributed towards a new efficient heating system, toilets, changing and access facilities suitable for people with disabilities as well as re-flooring the gymnasium and plastering of outer walls.
- Samlesbury Hall which received a grant of £34,477 to improve Samlesbury Hall as a visitor attraction by creating more exhibition space, to provide a space for school visits as well as for use by the local community and to keep the Hall in line with new legislation regarding disabled access.

## **€1 Million Euros for Humanities Research (UK)**

Just launched is a unique research funding opportunity that could allow UK arts and humanities academics access to up to one million Euros funding for collaborative research projects. Organised by HERA (Humanities in the European Research Area) and facilitated in the UK through the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) this Joint Research Programme (JRP) call is intended to enable trans-national Collaborative Research Projects in two humanities research areas:

- “Cultural dynamics”
- “Inheritance and identity” and “Humanities as a Source of Creativity and Innovation”.

This call is open to all UK humanities and arts academics and to ensure as many UK academics as possible have an opportunity to participate in this research call the AHRC will be holding two briefings at the end of January in London (29th) and Glasgow (30th) on how best to put an application together. Outline Proposals need to be submitted electronically via the HERA website by the 7th April and it is expected that Full Proposals will be invited in May 2009 with the 1st September 2009 as expected deadline for submission.

## **Arts Awards (UK)**

The Wellcome Trust is inviting organisations and individuals to apply for funding through its Arts Awards. The Arts Awards support projects that engage the public with biomedical science through the arts including dance, drama, performance arts, visual arts, music, film, craft, photography, creative writing or digital media. Applications are invited for projects up to £30,000. The aim of the awards is to support arts projects that reach new audiences which may not traditionally be interested in science and provide new ways of thinking about the social, cultural and ethical issues around contemporary science. The scheme is open to a wide range of people including, among others artists, scientists, curators, filmmakers, writers, producers, directors, academics, science communicators, teachers, arts workers and education officers. For small to medium-sized projects (up to and including £30 000) the next application deadline is the 3rd April 2009.

## **Daiwa Foundation (UK)**

The Daiwa Foundation is a grant giving charity that promotes links between the UK and Japan. The Foundation awards grants to individuals and institutions in the UK and Japan in all areas of the visual and performing arts, the humanities, the social sciences, science and engineering, mathematics, business studies, and education, including schools and universities, and grass roots and professional groups. The size of grants available range from £1,000 to £15,000 and can cover all fields of activity, including educational and grassroots exchanges, research travel, the organisation of conferences, exhibitions, collaborative projects between British and Japanese researchers in the field of science and other projects and events that fulfil objectives of the Foundation. The next application deadline is the 31st March 2009.

An example of a previous project funded by the Daiwa Foundation includes the Cottlesloe School in Buckinghamshire, which received a grant of £1,500 to support an educational exchange between the school and Japanese educational institutions, using drama to explore and understand cultural differences between the two countries.

In addition organisations can also apply for the Royal Society Daiwa Anglo-Japanese Foundation Joint Project Grants. Under this scheme funding of up to £6,000 per annum for two years is provided to cover travel, subsistence and research expenses. Eligible projects should include two teams of researchers: one based in the UK and the other based in Japan.

The next application deadline for the Royal Society Daiwa Anglo-Japanese Foundation Joint Project Grants is the 12th March 2009.

## **Britain Sasakawa Foundation Grants Programme (UK)**

The Britain Sasakawa Foundation, which aim is to develop good relations between the United Kingdom and Japan by advancing the education of the people of both nations in each other's culture, society and achievements. has announced that the next application deadline for its grants programme is the 31st March 2009. The Foundation seeks to promote mutual understanding and cooperation through financial support for activities in the following fields:

- Arts & Culture
- Science, Technology and Environment
- Humanities and Social Issues
- Japanese Language
- Medicine & Health
- Schools, Education and Youth Exchanges
- Sport.

Whilst encouraging applications in each of the previous fields, the Foundation particularly wishes to support activities/projects in science & technology; medicine & health; environment & social issues; Japanese studies; and in the Japanese language. Previous projects supported by the Foundation include County Upper School, Bury St Edmunds, which received a grant of £5,000 to help fund a study tour to Japan by eight Year 11 students and two teachers and Dundee University, School of Education which received a grant of £2,720 for a collaborative research project with Tsukuba University - 'Structures for inclusion of students with disabilities in the UK and Japan.

## **Community Foundation Launches Express Grants Scheme (Scotland)**

The Scottish Community Foundation has launched a new grants scheme aimed at community groups based in Scotland looking for funding. The new Express Grant scheme replaces the the small grants scheme and offers grants of up to £2,000 to groups where small amounts of funding to make big differences in their communities. As the name suggests, Express Grants have a straightforward application process, and a short turnaround time, meaning that within six weeks, applicants will know if they've been successful. ## **Culture Programme Announces 2009 Application Deadlines (UK)**

The European Commission has announced the latest call for proposals under its Culture programme (2007 – 13). The Culture programme is a €400 million programme which aims to support projects that enhance the cultural area shared by Europeans with a view to encouraging the emergence of European citizenship. Funding is available through a number of different strands including:

- Funding for multiannual co-operation projects to support trans-national cultural links by encouraging a minimum of six cultural operators from at least six eligible countries to cooperate and work across sectors to develop joint cultural activities
- Co-operation measures to support actions shared by at least three cultural operators, working across sectors, from at least three eligible countries
- Special measures which supports high-profile actions of substantial scale and scope.

They should make an impact on European citizens and help to promote a sense of European identity. These actions are supposed to raise awareness and appreciation among citizens of the richness of Europe's cultural diversity and to contribute to intercultural dialogue. ## **Call for Proposals – Town Twinning Citizens Meetings (UK)**

Under the Town Twinning Initiative, which is part of the new Active Citizens for Europe Programme (2007 -2013) grants of between €2,000 and €20,000 are available to support Town Twinning citizens meetings. Town twinning citizens' meetings consist in bringing together a wide range of citizens and citizens' groups from towns already twinned to further develop strong, informal and personal relations between their citizens, to reinforce the participants' commitment to European integration; and to contribute to the development of an active European citizenship. To be eligible the applicant needs to be the municipality or its twinning association in which the meeting will take place. The deadline for applications has now been extended to the 1st March 2009.

## **Knowledge Exchange Call (UK)**

The Natural Environment Research Council (NERC) , the UK's main agency for funding and managing research, training and knowledge exchange in the environmental sciences, has launched a new call for proposals under its Knowledge Exchange Call (KE Call). The aim of the KE Call is to support activities and projects that enable the sharing and flow of knowledge, people, skills and expertise between the UK's research base and the user community (public and private sector organisations). The types of activities that can be funded under this call include, but are not limited to:

- Special data management
- Formation of networks
- Employment of KE translators or facilitators
- Special publications
- Workshops
- Training for Industry or the public sector
- Decandments, fellowships or interchanges.

Awards are open to UK Higher Education Institutions (HEIs), NERC Research & Collaborative Centres, and Independent Research Organisations (IROs) approved by NERC. And are usually made for up to three years, but can be longer. The closing date for applications is 4pm on the 3rd March 2009.

## **RoSPA Offers Funding Opportunity to Safety Researchers (UK)**

Researchers into safety and accident prevention can now apply for funding through a £500,000 scholarship scheme established by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents. The scheme has been launched following a bequest from BNFL (British Nuclear Fuels Ltd) which will fund two to three scholarships a year for a decade, including for example, PhDs and shorter research projects. The scholarships aim to enable individuals and teams, both in the UK and overseas, to carry out research into safety and accident prevention issues that will produce defined, practical and influential outcomes to help save lives and prevent injuries. Applications are invited for projects in the range of £6k to £20k which address key safety themes including improving standards of driving and reducing home and leisure accidents. As well as general safety activities, other themes include raising the standards of health and safety management at work, reducing injuries in water, and enhancing risk understanding and awareness through education. The closing date for the first round of applications is April 17, 2009.

## **Migration for Development – Call for Proposals (UK)**

The EC-UN Joint Migration and Development Initiative has announced that it is seeking applications to support projects that create positive linkages between the phenomenon of migration and development in countries of migration origin, destination or transit. Projects proposed should be in one or more of the four thematic areas:

- Migrant capacities
- Migrant communities
- Migrant remittances
- Migrant rights.

The total amount available for this Joint Initiative is about €10 million and the value of each project proposed be a maximum of 200,000 Euro, and a minimum of 50,000 Euro. Projects should have a duration of a minimum of 12 months and a maximum of 18 months. Projects will only be considered from two or more applicant groups working together in a consortium. Grants will be awarded separately to each partner organisation in the consortium, to a maximum of 100,000 Euro per partner organisation. The countries covered by this call are Georgia, Moldova, Morocco, Tunisia, Algeria, Senegal, Cape Verde, Ghana, Nigeria, Mali, Ethiopia, Sri Lanka, Philippines, Jamaica and Ecuador. This call is open to civil society groups and local governments. The closing date for applications is the 13th March 2009.

## **£500,000 for Cultural Heritage Workforce Development (England)**

The Museums, Libraries and Archives Council (MLA) has committed £500,000 to fund new Creative Apprenticeships, a scheme spearheaded by Creative and Cultural Skills in partnership with MLA and the Museums Association (MA). The funding commitment was announced at the launch of an action plan for the UK cultural heritage sector that will see up to 50 Creative Apprenticeships across England, predominantly in the museum sector, from next year. The funding backs up a key finding of the action plan - the need to increase entry-routes into the sector and to ensure that the workforce reflects the diversity of the UK - and is aimed specifically at young people who do not have a higher qualification who would like an opportunity to work in the cultural heritage sector. The funding is additional to the £100,000 that MLA has already provided to support ten Creative Apprenticeships at museums in England. The MLA is also offering to pay tuition fees to assist up to 20 people already working in the sector to undertake Foundation Degrees.

## **Creative Industries Innovation Fund Reopens for Applications (Northern Ireland)**

The Northern Ireland Arts Council has announced that the Creative Industries Innovation Fund is open for applications. The fund is open to all creative businesses in Northern Ireland, including sole traders, partnerships and incorporated businesses.

- The first call will be to Sectoral Bodies only, for innovative initiatives which will develop the infrastructure, knowledge and people within the sector.
- Subsequently there will be three levels of grant available to individual businesses; for projects up to £10,000, 100% grants are available; for business seeking to become active Invest NI clients companies, through a process of strategy and capacity development, a grant of up to 75% is available, up to a max of £75,000; and in all other cases the maximum grant is 75% up to a max of £50,000.

## **Other Funding News**

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### **Coalfields Regeneration Trust Temporarily Closes Revenue Funding Streams (UK)**

The Coalfields Regeneration Trust (CRT), which aims to revitalise the former coalfield areas in the UK, has announced that it is vastly oversubscribed with requests for revenue funding and therefore cannot make any further awards for revenue funding at this time. In the meantime the Trust can still award capital grants of £10,000 or more through its Bridging the Gap Scheme. The CRT will support projects that fit into one or more of the following funding themes: Access to employment; Education and skills; Health and wellbeing; and Access to opportunities. CRT offers quick access to funds and aims to make a decision within 12 weeks of receiving an application. The funding programme is due to run for three years from April 2008 to March 2011. Since being founded, the CRT has awarded £150 million through its grant-making programmes. In addition to the Bridging the Gap programme, the CRT can award capital grants of up to £300,000 through its main grants programme to bigger voluntary, community and statutory organisations. ## Funding Reminders

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### **Futurebuilders Consortia Fund (England)**

Futurebuilders , which offers investment in the form of loans and grants to third sector organisation to help them bid for and win public contracts, recently announced the launch of its new Consortia Fund. The Consortia Fund offers a combination of loan finance and professional support specifically for consortia groups aiming to work together to win public service contracts. Consortia are defined as two or more organisations that enter into a formal agreement, or form a separate entity to jointly bid for, and deliver, public service contracts. There is no upper limit to the size of investment, but the minimum investment package is £50,000. To be eligible to apply to the Consortia Fund, the consortium must have a specific contract in mind and have the basis of the consortia structure in place and the consortium must possess the potential to win contracts to deliver public services. In addition to the Consortia Fund, Futurebuilders also invests in third sector organisations through:

- The Tender Fund which is a three year interest-free loans of between £3,000 and £50,000.
- The Small Organisation Tender Fund which provides grants of up to £15,000 to help small organisations tender successfully for specific public sector contracts;
- The Full Investment Fund, which is Futurebuilders main product and the majority of their investments are made from this Fund.

### **Crisis –Changing Lives Programme (UK)**

Crisis, the national Homeless Charity has announced that the Changing Lives Programme will be re-open for applications from the 26 January 2009 until 13 March 2009. The Crisis Changing Lives programme provides financial awards of up to £2,500 to solitary people who are homeless or settling into a home and looking for support so that they may achieve their vocational goals. The Awards can be used for; course fees; equipment or materials for courses; tools materials and equipment to get back to work; and to set up a business. Applications can not be made by the homeless person, but rather by the support organisation providing ongoing help. This could be a key worker, someone providing guidance concerning training or employment, a housing support officer or someone like a mental health worker.

## **Equitable Charitable Trust (UK)**

Charitable organisations working towards educating young people, especially young people with disabilities and/or from disadvantaged backgrounds can apply for funding of up to £30,000 through the Equitable Charitable Trust. The Trustees award approximately £1 million a year and seeks to identify and support good projects that address needs not adequately met at present, including those with potential to be introduced to large numbers of schools.

Grants made by the Trust fall into three broad categories:

- education projects or services that support the learning and development of disabled children and young people in the UK;
- education projects for disadvantaged children and young people in the UK, particularly those that support delivery of the National Curriculum or vocational learning opportunities;
- education projects that will help increase participation in, or improve the quality of, education for disadvantaged or disabled children and young people in developing countries.

The length of funding can range from one to three years. Previously supported projects include supplementary Maths, English and Science classes for disadvantaged 5-18 year olds; education projects to reduce teenage pregnancies; capital grants for the renovation and refurbishment of facilities for children with complex needs and disabilities; and music education projects for children and young people with profound and multiple learning difficulties. Applications can be submitted at any time and are considered on a rolling basis by the Trustees.

## **Funding for Local Sustainable Energy Projects (England, Scotland & Wales)**

Local community groups and not for profit organisations located in England, Scotland and Wales that wish to implement sustainable energy projects in their buildings have the opportunity to apply for grants of up to £20,000 through the E.ON Source Fund. Examples of organisations that have been funded in the past include schools, local and national charities, special education colleges and wildlife parks. Projects that can be considered for funding include the purchase and installation of one or more renewable energy technologies (e.g. wind, solar thermal, PV, wood etc); the renovation of existing facilities to incorporate micro-generation technology; an energy efficiency makeover for building that could demonstrate significant energy savings and also behavioural change amongst users; the use of new or innovative technology to deliver either energy savings or micro-generation capacity; projects which can demonstrate the intelligent use of waste energy (e.g. a district heating system that uses waste heat from one building to heat or power another). The deadline for applications is the 15th May 2009.

## **Paul Hamlyn Foundation Education and Learning Programme (UK)**

The Paul Hamlyn Foundation is currently accepting applications under its Education and Learning programme. In particular, the Foundation is looking to fund projects that promote innovation and change in the areas of supplementary education; tackling school exclusion and truancy; and developing speaking and listening skills for 11-19 year olds. Eligible organisations that can apply for funding include charities, local authorities individual pre-schools, schools, out-of-school clubs, supplementary schools, colleges and youth clubs if they demonstrate benefits to the wider community and include partnership working that will result in increasing access to education and learning to all communities and age groups. The costs that can be covered by the Foundation's grants include running costs such as staff salaries and overheads such as stationery, rent, rates and utilities. There is no minimum or maximum size of grant that organisation's can apply for. In 2007-08 the Foundation made 51 grants under our Education and Learning Open Grants Scheme. The average grant was £60,000 and grants ranged in size from £5,000 to £300,000. Applications can be made at any time.

## **Clore Duffield Performing Arts Awards (UK)**

Organisations such as registered charities youth groups, limited companies and schools that wish to undertake activities that enable young people aged 0-18 to experience the performing arts are eligible to apply for funding under the Clore Duffield Performing Arts Awards (formally known as the Clore Duffield Small Grants for Performing Arts Education programme). This is a £1 million programme that will operate between 2005 and 2010. Eligible organisations can apply for funding of between £1,000 and £10,000 for educational projects with under 18s that cover every aspect of the performing arts including opera, dance, music, musical theatre, the spoken word and theatre. The next closing date for applications is the 11th March 2009.
